"Welcoming Vaccines for the Common Good"

Statement of the Irish Catholic Bishops

The Catholic Church recognises that safe and effective vaccination is an essential aspect of the prevention of disease. We are encouraging Catholics to support a programme of vaccination, not only for their own good, but for the protection of life and the health of those who are vulnerable and for the common good of humanity. Questions have arisen that human foetal cell-lines, which have their origins in abortions carried out in the past, are used in the development and production of some of the vaccines for Covid-19. If a more ethically acceptable alternative is not readily available to them, it is morally permissible for Catholics to accept a vaccine which involves the use of foetal cell-lines, especially if the potential risk to life or health is significant, as in the case of a pandemic. Refusal to accept a vaccine could contribute to significant loss of life in the community and especially among those who are most vulnerable. This reality must inform any judgement of conscience.

We reaffirm the consistent teaching of the Church that abortion is always gravely immoral. The Church has always made a distinction, however, between formal (deliberate) involvement in an immoral act and material involvement, which may be incidental and remote. The decision of those who decide to accept vaccines which have had some link with foetal celllines in the past does not imply any consent on their part to abortion.

We note that many of the vaccines currently being developed do not depend for their design or production on foetal cell lines. Catholics should continue to advocate for the availability of ethically-developed vaccines. In that way they bear witness that biomedical research should always be conducted in a manner which is consistent with respect for life and for human dignity. Access to healthcare is a fundamental human right. The Church, while respecting intellectual property rights, believes that essential medicines, including vaccines, should be made available on the basis of need rather than on the basis of capacity to pay. This position is consistent with the TRIPS agreement of the WTO, which permits national governments to arrange for the manufacture of essential pharmaceuticals, for domestic use and for the use of poorer countries, even without the consent of patent owners.

Sunday of the Word of God

In 2019, Pope Francis dedicated the third Sunday of the Year as the Sunday of the Word of God. The date chosen is suitable because on the third Sunday we begin reading the Gospel for this year from the start. Mark 1:14-20 shows us Jesus proclaiming the Kingdom and tells the story of the call of the first disciples. The opening two verses are important: Now after John was imprisoned, Jesus went into Galilee and proclaimed the gospel of God. He said, "The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God is near. Convert and believe the gospel!" (Mark 1:14–15).

Why do we read the Bible in any case? To hear again the proclamation of God's reign and to take up once more the call to conversion of heart and life. In his address to mark the announcement of the Sunday of the Word of God, Pope Francis stressed the importance of the Word of God in our lives and how it can help us to get to know Jesus. The Pope stated that we are surrounded by many voices and we need to hear the Word of God more than any other voice. To help us he advised to keep a copy of the Bible close by or to have a copy of it available to us.

Thought for the Day

The journey of life inevitably brings up the question what should I be, who should I become? Is life a maze or a labyrinth? Is it just round and round or is there a way out? How will I be as a spouse, a parent, a partner, a church member, a priest or religious? Within the Christian project, do I feel myself called to "activate" my baptism is some particular ministry or contribution? Such discernment will take in the grateful acknowledgement of my gifts as well as an examination of my inner generosity of spirit. In reality, we are all called by the Lord to build up the Body of Christ. It is not a question of if but rather of how.

We should pray: God of surprises, take me by surprise once more and let me see how my special gifts could be part of your project of the Kingdom in Jesus.
