Seeing your Life through the Lens of the Gospel

- John gives an example of humility as a person confident in his own role but not seeking to claim to be more than he is. He acknowledges that Jesus is greater. There is a freedom in being able to acknowledge the gifts of others without losing a sense of one's own giftedness. Recall times when we you were able to do this.
- The Baptism of Jesus was an extraordinary religious experience for him. Something happened that was a major step forward for Jesus in coming to know that he was the Beloved Son of God. We all have events in our lives that are milestones along the road of discovering who we are. What have been these milestones for you?
- "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." Bring to mind experiences in which you knew you were the beloved (of God or of another person) and that the one who loved you was well pleased. Remember these experiences with gratitude, knowing that the only proper response to love received is thankfulness. Perhaps you have also given this experience to another.
- It is easy to lament the growing secularization in the world today, but the Spirit of God who spoke loudly to the world in the Christ-event is active today. How can we be open to the new things the Spirit is saying to the Church today?

Thirsting for God

We have seen such expressions of thirst! We have seen souls thirsting for justice; souls thirsting for freedom. Souls thirsting for truth; souls thirsting for transparency. We have seen souls thirsting for the highest things; thirsting for hope, thirsting for peace!

The words of the prophet Isaiah this Sunday will pierce our hearts. The prophet cries out, "All you who are thirsty, come to the water!" What is the water? The water is the wisdom and law of the Lord! Just as life cannot continue to exist without water, hearts will continue to cry out in search of the wisdom and law of the Lord.

We were made for this law. In the here and now, what will quench our thirst? The way of the Lord! If we are baptized with him, we shall rise with him! (Romans 6:3-5). He is justice; He is freedom. He is transparency; He is truth. He is our hope; He is our peace!

Come to the Water

Today we celebrate the Baptism of Jesus, the moment when God reveals who Jesus is. Our readings are rich with water imagery. Water is a powerful symbol throughout the Scriptures, from the story of creation and the crossing of the Red Sea, to the wedding feast at Cana and Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well. It is a symbol of life and newness, an opportunity for God to reach out to us, be present with us and teach us something, as well as an opportunity for cleansing and a fresh start.

Our gospel today tells of Jesus being baptised by John in the river Jordan. This immersion in water marks the beginning of Jesus' ministry. By approaching John for baptism, along with all the others, Jesus is identifying with the people and allowing himself to be counted among sinners. It is a sign that he submitting to God's will. At this crucial moment, as soon as he emerges from the Jordan, Jesus sees the heavens open and the voice of God confirming him as 'Beloved Son'. It is a moment of divine approval, confirming Jesus' identity and launching him on his new mission.

The baptism of Jesus is a reminder of our own identity and mission. We are beloved daughters and sons of God, sisters and brothers of Jesus, members of God's family. In today's first reading we are invited: 'Come to the water all you who are thirsty'. We are called to the water, to that moment when we recognise who Jesus is, who we are, and our mission to live as children of God.

From Ossory to the Archdiocese of Dublin

Bishop Dermot Farrell's transfer from the Diocese of Ossory to the Archdiocese of Dublin is not first! Twice before, a Bishop of Ossory was transferred to Dublin. Our thanks to Fr. Richard Scriven, St. Mary's Cathedral for the following information.

<u>Richard de Northalis (1387-1395)</u>: Richard was the son of a wealthy merchant, who had held the office of Lord Mayor of London. He was a Carmelite who was promoted to the see of Ossory when Alexander De Balscott was transferred to the Diocese of Meath. The exact year of his appointment is difficult to state but it seems likely that he was appointed towards the close of 1386. He was absent from Ossory for the first six years being employed by the King as his Ambassador at the Papal and other courts. He was also for a time Chancellor of Ireland. He was promoted to the Archdiocese of Dublin in 1395 and died on the 20th July 1397.

<u>John Thomas Troy (1776-1786)</u>: John Thomas Troy, a native of Blanchardstown, entered the Dominican Order in St. Clemente in Rome in 1756. After a distinguished time as a student he was appointed Prior of St. Clemente. On the 27th November 1776 he was appointed to the See of Ossory, vacant upon the death of Thomas Burke who was bishop from 1759 to 1776. While a branch of the Troy family had settled in Kilkenny some centuries earlier there is nothing to link Bishop Troy with the natives.

Troy left Rome for Ireland on the 21st March 1777. He was consecrated bishop in Louvain, on route home, on the 8th June – strange that the consecration did not take place in Rome! He celebrated his first Mass as Bishop of Ossory in St. Canice's Church on the 17th August. The new bishop lived in Dean Street – and kept a horse there during his Dublin days!

The slight relaxation of the penal laws around this time gave Troy the opportunity to establish a Catholic College in the city. Troy entrusted the task to Rev. John Dunne and Rev. James Lanigan and in 1782 St Kieran's College was opened.

Dr Troy was appointed to the Archdiocese of Dublin on the 27th November 1786 and was archbishop until 1823. Dunne succeeded him in Ossory and Lanigan became bishop in 1789.
